# Systems of Quasilinear Parabolic Equations with Discontinuous Coefficients and Continuous Delays

This paper is concerned with a weakly coupled system of quasilinear parabolic equations where the coefficients are allowed to be discontinuous and the reaction functions may depend on continuous delays. By the method of upper and lower solutions and the associated monotone iterations and by difference ratios method and various estimates, we obtained the existence and uniqueness of the global piecewise classical solutions under certain conditions including mixed quasimonotone property of reaction functions. Applications are given to three 2-species VolterraLotka models with discontinuous coefficients and continuous delays.

## 1. Introduction

Reaction-diffusion equations with time delays have been studied by many researchers (see [1-8] and references therein). However, all of the discussions in the literature are devoted to the equations with continuous coefficients. In this paper, we consider a weakly coupled system of quasilinear parabolic equations where the coefficients are allowed to be discontinuous and the reaction functions may depend on continuous (infinite or finite) delays.

To describe the problem, we first introduce some notations. Let $\Omega$ be a bounded domain with the boundary $\partial \Omega$ in $\mathbb{R}^{n}(n \geq 1)$. Suppose that $\Omega$ consists of a finite number of domains $\Omega_{k}(k=1, \ldots, K)$ separated by $\Gamma_{k^{\prime}}$, where $\Gamma_{k^{\prime}}, k^{\prime}=1, \ldots, K^{\prime}$, are surfaces which do not intersect with each other and with $\partial \Omega$. $\Gamma:=\cup \Gamma_{k^{\prime}}$ and $\overrightarrow{\mathbf{n}}$ is the normal to $\Gamma$. The symbol $[v]_{\Gamma \times[0,+\infty)}$ denotes the jump in the function $v$ as it crosses $\Gamma \times[0,+\infty)$. For any vector function $\mathbf{u}=\left(u^{1}, \ldots, u^{N}\right)$, we write $u_{t}^{l}:=\partial u^{l} / \partial t, u_{x_{i}}^{l}:=\partial u^{l} / \partial x_{i}, u_{x}^{l}:=\left(u_{x_{1}}^{l}, \ldots, u_{x_{n}}^{l}\right), l=1, \ldots, N$, $i=1, \ldots, n$.

In this paper, we consider the following reaction-diffusion system:

$N_{0}$ is a nonnegative integer, and $r^{l}, l=N_{0}+1, \ldots, N$, are positive constants.
The equations with discontinuous coefficients have been investigated extensively in the literature (see [9-16] and references therein]). However, the discussions in these literature are devoted either to scalar equations without time delays or to coupled system of equations without time delays and with the restrictive conditions that the principal parts are the same and the convection functions $b^{l}\left(x, t, \mathbf{u}, u_{x}^{l}\right)$ satisfy (see [16])

In this paper we will extend the method of upper and lower solutions and the monotone iteration scheme to reaction-diffusion system with discontinuous coefficients and continuous delays and use these methods and the results of $[15,16]$ to prove the existence and uniqueness of the piecewise classical solutions for (1.1) under hypothesis (H) in Section 2.

This paper is organized as follows. In the next section we will prove a weak comparison principle and construct two monotone sequences. Section 3 is devoted to
investigate the uniform estimates of the sequences. In Section 4 we prove the existence and uniqueness of the piecewise classical solutions for (1.1). Applications of these results are given in Section 5 to three 2-species Volterra-Lotka models with discontinuous coefficients and continuous delays.

## 2. Two Monotone Sequences

The aim of this section is to prove a weak comparison principle and construct two monotone sequences. In Section 4 we will show that these sequences converge to the unique solution of (1.1).

### 2.1. The Definitions, Hypotheses, and Weak Comparison Principle

In all that follows, pairs of indices $i$ or $j$ imply a summation from 1 to $n$. The symbol $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \subset \Omega$ means that $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \Omega$ and $\operatorname{dist}\left(\Omega^{\prime}, \partial \Omega\right)>0$. For any $T>0$, we set

The weak upper and lower solutions $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}, \widehat{\mathbf{u}}$ in hypothesis (H)-(ii) will be used as the initial iterations to construct two monotone convergent sequences.

## 3. Uniform Estimates of $\left\{\bar{u}_{m}\right\},\left\{\underline{u}_{m}\right\}$

To prove the existence of solutions to (1.1), in this section, we show the uniform estimates of $\left\{\overline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\},\left\{\underline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\}$.

### 3.3. Uniform Estimates on $\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \times[0, T]$

The bounds in this subsection will be of a local nature. By hypothesis (H)-(i) for any given point $x^{0} \in \Gamma$ there exists a ball $K_{\rho}$ with center at $x^{0}$ such that we can straighten $\Gamma \cap K_{\rho}$ out introducing new nondegenerate coordinates $y=y(x)$ possessing bounded first and second
derivatives with respect to $x$. It is possible to divide $\Gamma$ into a finite number of pieces and introduce for each of them coordinates $y$ (see [11, Chapter 3, Section 16]). Therefore, without loss of generality we assume that the interface $\Gamma$ lies in the plane $x_{n}=0$.

In [15], Tan and Leng investigate the Hölder estimates for the first derivatives of the generalized solution $u$ for one parabolic equation with discontinuous coefficients and without time delays. The estimates $\left\|u_{x_{j}}\right\|_{C^{\alpha}\left(\left(\overline{\Omega^{\prime} \cap \Omega_{k}}\right) \times\left[t^{\prime}, T\right]\right)},\left\|u_{t}\right\|_{C^{\alpha}\left(\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \times\left[t^{\prime}, T\right]\right)}$ in [15] depend on $\max _{\left[t^{\prime}, T\right]}\left(\left\|u_{t}\right\|_{L^{q / 2}(\Omega)}+\left\|u_{t}\right\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}\right)$ for some $q>n$, where $\Omega^{\prime} \subset \subset \Omega, 0<t^{\prime}<T$. The results of [15] can not be used directly in this paper, but, by a slight modification, the methods and the framework of [15] can be used to obtain the uniform estimates of $\left\|U_{m x_{j}}^{l}\right\|_{C^{\alpha}\left(\left(\overline{\Omega^{\prime} \cap \Omega_{k}}\right) \times[0, T]\right)}$, $\left\|U_{m t}^{l}\right\|_{C^{\alpha}\left(\bar{\Omega}^{\prime} \times[0, T]\right)}$ in this subsection. We omit most of the detailed proofs and only sketch the main steps. The main changes in the derivations are the following: (i) [15, formulas (2.7) and (4.2)] are replaced by (3.9) and (3.10), respectively; (ii) the estimates in this subsection are on $\Omega^{\prime} \times[0, T]$, while the estimates in [15] are on $\Omega^{\prime} \times\left[t^{\prime}, T\right]$; (iii) the behavior of the reaction functions with continuous delays requires special considerations.

By the methods of Section 3.3 and [10] we can get the estimates near $\partial \Omega$. The details are omitted. Then the estimates near $\partial \Omega$ and the results of the above subsections give (3.35) and (3.36).

## 4. Existence and Uniqueness of Solutions for (1.1)

In this section we show that the sequences $\left\{\overline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\},\left\{\underline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\}$ converge to the unique solution of (1.1) and prove the main theorem of this paper.

Theorem 4.1. Let hypothesis $(H)$ hold. Then, problem (1.1) has a unique piecewise classical solution $\mathbf{u}^{*}$ in $S$, and the sequences $\left\{\overline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\},\left\{\underline{\mathbf{u}}_{m}\right\}$ given by (2.29) converge monotonically to $\mathbf{u}^{*}$. The relation

Estimates (3.5), (3.6), (3.35), and (3.36) imply that there exists a subsequence $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m^{\prime}}\right\}$ (denoted by $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m}\right\}$ still) such that $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m}\right\}$ and $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m t}\right\}$ converge in $\mathcal{C}\left(\bar{\Phi}_{T}\right)$ to $\mathbf{u}$ and $\mathbf{u}_{\mathrm{t}}$, respectively, for each $i, j=1, \ldots, n,\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m x_{j}}\right\}$ converges in $\mathcal{C}\left(\bar{\Phi}_{k, T}\right)$ to $\mathbf{u}_{x_{j},},\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m x_{i} x_{j}}\right\}$ converges weakly in $\mathfrak{\perp}^{2}\left(\boldsymbol{\Phi}_{k, T}\right)$ to $\mathbf{u}_{x_{i} x_{j}}$, and $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m x_{j} t}\right\}$ converges weakly in $\boldsymbol{\perp}^{2}\left(\boldsymbol{\Phi}_{T}\right)$ to $\mathbf{u}_{x_{j} t}(k=1, \ldots, K)$. Thus, $\mathbf{u} \in \mathcal{C}^{\alpha_{1}, \alpha_{1} / 2}\left(\bar{\Phi}_{T}\right), \mathbf{u}_{x_{j}} \in \mathcal{C}^{\alpha_{4}, \alpha_{4} / 2}\left(\overline{\boldsymbol{\Phi}}_{k, T}\right), \mathbf{u}_{t} \in \mathcal{C}^{\alpha_{4}, \alpha_{4} / 2}\left(\bar{\Phi}_{T}\right)$, and $\mathbf{u}_{x_{j} t} \in \mathcal{\perp}^{2}\left(\boldsymbol{\Phi}_{T}\right)$. Since $u^{l}=\psi^{l}$ in $Q_{0}^{l}, l=1, \ldots, N$, then $\mathbf{u} \in \mathcal{C}^{\alpha_{1}, \alpha_{1} / 2}\left(\bar{Q}_{T}\right)$. For any given $k, k=1, \ldots, K$, and any given $\Omega^{\prime \prime} \subset \subset \Omega_{k}$ and $t^{\prime \prime} \in(0, T)$, (3.37) in Theorem 3.7 implies that there exists a subsequence $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m^{\prime}}\right\}$ (denoted by $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m}\right\}$ still) such that $\left\{\mathbf{u}_{m}\right\}$ converges in $\mathcal{C}^{2,1}\left(\bar{\Omega}^{\prime \prime} \times\left[t^{\prime \prime}, T\right]\right)$ to $\mathbf{u}$. Then $\mathbf{u} \in \mathcal{C}^{2+\alpha_{5}, 1+\alpha_{5} / 2}\left(\bar{\Omega}^{\prime \prime} \times\left[t^{\prime \prime}, T\right]\right)$.

Furthermore, (2.35) shows that $\overline{\mathbf{u}}, \underline{\mathbf{u}}$ satisfy (2.16) with $\mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v}, q^{l}$ and the symbol " $\leq$ " replaced by $\underline{\mathbf{u}}, \overline{\mathbf{u}}, g^{l}$, and the symbol " $=$ ", respectively. By Lemma 2.4 we get that $\overline{\mathbf{u}}=\underline{\mathbf{u}}$ for $(x, t) \in \bar{D}_{T}$. In view of $\bar{u}^{l}(x, t)=\underline{u}^{l}(x, t)=\psi^{l}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in Q_{0}^{l}$, then $\bar{u}^{l}=\underline{u}^{l}$ for $(x, t) \in \overline{\bar{Q}}_{T}^{l}, l=1, \ldots, N$. Consequently, by (4.4) and Definition 2.3, $\mathbf{u}^{*}:=\overline{\mathbf{u}}=\underline{\mathbf{u}}$ is a piecewise classical solution of (1.1) in $S$ and satisfies the relation (4.1). If $\mathbf{u}^{* *}$ is also a piecewise classical solution of (1.1) in $\mathcal{S}$, then by Lemma 2.4 the same argument shows that $\mathbf{u}^{*} \equiv \mathbf{u}^{* *}$. Therefore, the piecewise classical solution of (1.1) in $S$ is unique.

Since $T$ is an arbitrary positive number, the piecewise classical solution $\mathbf{u}^{*}$ given by Theorem 4.1 is global.

## 5. Applications in Ecology

Consider 2-species Volterra-Lotka models with diffusion and continuous delays (see [2,3]). Suppose that the natural conditions for the subdomains $\Omega_{k}, k=1, \ldots, K$, are different. Then the diffusion coefficients are allowed to be discontinuous on the interface $\Gamma$. Assume that near $\Gamma$, the density and the flux are continuous. Then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left[u^{l}\right]_{\Gamma_{T}}=0, \quad\left[a_{i j}^{l}\left(x, t, u^{l}\right) u_{x_{j}}^{l} \cos \left(\overrightarrow{\mathbf{n}}, x_{i}\right)\right]_{\Gamma_{T}}=0, \quad l=1,2 \tag{5.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $u^{1}, u^{2}$ are the densities of the populations of the two species. Therefore, $u^{1}, u^{2}$ are governed by the system (1.1), where the reaction functions are explicitly given as follows.
(1) For the Volterra-Lotka cooperation model with continuous delays,

\begin{array}{ll}
g^{1}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{1}\left(r_{k}^{1}-\delta_{k}^{1} u^{1}+\sigma_{k}^{1} J^{2} * u^{2}\right) & \left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K,  \tag{5.2}\\
g^{2}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{2}\left(r_{k}^{2}+\delta_{k}^{2} J^{1} * u^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{2} u^{2}\right) & \left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K .
\end{array}
$$

(2) For the Volterra-Lotka competition model with continuous delays,

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
g^{1}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{1}\left(r_{k}^{1}-\delta_{k}^{1} u^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{1} J^{2} * u^{2}\right) & \left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K \\
g^{2}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{2}\left(r_{k}^{2}-\delta_{k}^{2} J^{1} * u^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{2} u^{2}\right) \quad\left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K . \tag{5.3}
\end{array}
$$

(3) For the Volterra-Lotka prey-predator model with continuous delays,

$$
\begin{align*}
& g^{1}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{1}\left(r_{k}^{1}-\delta_{k}^{1} u^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{1} J^{2} * u^{2}\right) \quad\left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K,  \tag{5.4}\\
& g^{2}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u})=u^{2}\left(r_{k}^{2}+\delta_{k}^{2} J^{1} * u^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{2} u^{2}\right) \quad\left((x, t) \in D_{k, T}\right), k=1, \ldots, K .
\end{align*}
$$

Here $r_{k^{\prime}}^{l} \delta_{k^{\prime}}^{l}$, and $\sigma_{k}^{l}$ are all positive constants for $k=1, \ldots, K, l=1,2$.
Theorem 5.1. Let the functions $a_{i j}^{l}\left(x, t, u^{l}\right), b_{j}^{l}\left(x, t, u^{l}\right), h^{l}(x, t)$, and $\psi^{l}(x, t), l=1,2$, satisfy the hypotheses in (H). If $h^{l}(x, t)$ and $\psi^{l}(x, t), l=1,2$, are nonnegative functions and the condition $\bar{b}^{2} / \bar{b}^{1}<\bar{c}^{2} / \bar{c}^{1}$ holds for the cooperation model, where $\bar{b}^{1}=\min _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(\delta_{k}^{1} / r_{k}^{1}\right), \bar{c}^{1}=$ $\max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(\sigma_{k}^{1} / r_{k}^{1}\right), \bar{b}^{2}=\max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(\delta_{k}^{2} / r_{k}^{2}\right)$, and $\bar{c}^{2}=\min _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(\sigma_{k}^{2} / r_{k}^{2}\right)$, and if $N=2$ and $g^{l}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u}), l=1,2$, are given by one of (5.2)-(5.4), then problem (1.1) has a unique nonnegative piecewise classical solution.

Proof. By Theorem 4.1, the proof of this theorem is completed if there exist a pair of coupled weak upper and lower solutions $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ for each case of (5.2)-(5.4), where $M^{1}$ and $M^{2}$ are positive constants. We next prove the existence of $M^{1}$ and $M^{2}$ for each case. Note that (1.2) and (2.13) imply that $J *\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right)=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right)$.

Case 1. $g^{l}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u}), l=1,2$, are given by (5.2). Then $\mathbf{g}(\cdot, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v})=\left(g^{1}(\cdot, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v}), g^{2}(\cdot, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v})\right)$ is quasimonotone nondecreasing. The requirement of $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ in Definition 2.2 becomes

$$
\begin{equation*}
M^{1}\left[1-\frac{\delta_{k}^{1}}{r_{k}^{1}} M^{1}+\frac{\sigma_{k}^{1}}{r_{k}^{1}} M^{2}\right] \leq 0, \quad M^{2}\left[1+\frac{\delta_{k}^{2}}{r_{k}^{2}} M^{1}-\frac{\sigma_{k}^{2}}{r_{k}^{2}} M^{2}\right] \leq 0, \quad k=1, \ldots, K . \tag{5.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

Since $\bar{b}^{2} / \bar{b}^{1}<\bar{c}^{2} / \bar{c}^{1}$, by the argument in [1, Page 676] we conclude that there exist positive constants $\eta^{1}$ and $\eta^{2}$ such that, for any $R \geq 1$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
1-\bar{b}^{1} R \eta^{1}+\bar{c}^{1} R \eta^{2} \leq 0, \quad 1+\bar{b}^{2} R \eta^{1}-\bar{c}^{2} R \eta^{2} \leq 0 \tag{5.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

There exists $R_{0}$ such that $R_{0} \eta^{l} \geq h^{l}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in S_{T}$ and $R_{0} \eta^{l} \geq \psi^{l}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in \bar{Q}_{0}^{l}, l=$ 1,2. If $\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right) \geq\left(R_{0} \eta^{1}, R_{0} \eta^{2}\right)$, then $\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right)$ satisfies (5.5), and $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ are a pair of coupled weak upper and lower solutions of (1.1).

Case 2. $g^{l}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u}), l=1,2$, are given by (5.3). $\mathbf{g}(\cdot, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v})$ is mixed quasimonotone. The requirement of $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right)$, $\widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ in Definition 2.2 becomes

$$
\begin{equation*}
M^{1}\left(r_{k}^{1}-\delta_{k}^{1} M^{1}\right) \leq 0, \quad M^{2}\left(r_{k}^{2}-\sigma_{k}^{2} M^{2}\right) \leq 0, \quad k=1, \ldots, K . \tag{5.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right) \geq\left(\max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(r_{k}^{1} / \delta_{k}^{1}\right), \max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(r_{k}^{2} / \sigma_{k}^{2}\right)\right), M^{l} \geq h^{l}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in S_{T}$, and $M^{l} \geq$ $\psi^{l}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in \bar{Q}_{0}^{l}, l=1,2$, then $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ are a pair of coupled weak upper and lower solutions of (1.1).

Case 3. $g^{l}(x, t, \mathbf{u}, J * \mathbf{u}), l=1,2$, are given by $(5.4) . \mathbf{g}(\cdot, \mathbf{u}, \mathbf{v})$ is mixed quasimonotone. The requirement of $\widetilde{\mathbf{u}}=\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ in Definition 2.2 becomes

$$
\begin{equation*}
M^{1}\left(r_{k}^{1}-\delta_{k}^{1} M^{1}\right) \leq 0, \quad M^{2}\left(r_{k}^{2}+\delta_{k}^{2} M^{1}-\sigma_{k}^{2} M^{2}\right) \leq 0, \quad k=1, \ldots, K \tag{5.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

We first choose $M^{1}$ satisfying $M^{1} \geq \max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(r_{k^{\prime}}^{1} / \delta_{k}^{1}\right), M^{1} \geq h^{1}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in S_{T}$ and $M^{1} \geq \psi^{1}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in \bar{Q}_{0}^{1}$, and then we choose $M^{2}$ satisfying $M^{2} \geq \max _{k=1, \ldots, K}\left(r_{k}^{2} / \sigma_{k}^{2}+\right.$ $\left.\delta_{k}^{2} M^{1} / \sigma_{k}^{2}\right), M^{2} \geq h^{2}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in S_{T}$, and $M^{2} \geq \psi^{2}(x, t)$ for $(x, t) \in \bar{Q}_{0}^{2}$. Thus, $\tilde{\mathbf{u}}=$ $\left(M^{1}, M^{2}\right), \widehat{\mathbf{u}}=(0,0)$ are a pair of coupled weak upper and lower solutions of (1.1).
